PROCESS

- Provide the rationale and possible applications for administering an inventory.
- Administer the inventory, score, and make the data public.

ALTERNATIVES

- Groups collectively assess themselves using an inventory.

TIPS

- Responses on inventories are not good or bad. Inventories provide information that carries whatever meaning the group assigns to it.
- Many inventories can assist a group in learning about itself, either as individuals within the group or collectively.
- Some examples of individual inventories include cognitive style, educational belief systems, modality preferences, people search, and five states of mind.
